Lucketts ‘Volunteer’ Fire Company Shares its History

What we know as the Lucketts Volunteer Fire Company (LVFC) began in 1961 as Fire Company 10. Back then, the vehicles used were stored at the residences of the volunteer fire fighters. Time passed and the first two bays of the fire house were constructed, the vehicles were stored in the new facility. The building that we know today was built for the most part by the volunteers who worked for the fire company during the 1960’s.

The original members of the fire company were local farmers and trades people. These men dropped what they were doing at the sound of the fire house alarm to perform their duties. As the economy changed, potential young volunteers found more lucrative opportunities “off the farm”. This brought about the 24/7 career staff coverage which is in place today. When our community calls, the LVFC provides the assistance needed whether it is from the volunteers, career staff or both.

In those early days, the volunteer members provided fire suppression only and as needs changed, in the 1980’s the LVFC began providing Emergency Medical Services (EMS). A number of the volunteers took EMS training to better meet the needs of our community.

Later, a couple of members enhanced their skills with Advance Life Support (ALS) training. The Company’s license was upgraded from a non-transport Basic Life Support (BLS) to a non-transport ALS and allowed advanced medical assistance to the community prior to the ambulance’s arrival. This was another example of how the Lucketts Volunteer Fire Company answered the call of the ever changing needs of our community.

Unfortunately, volunteerism for the LVFC has seen a decline. Similarly, volunteer fire and rescue systems across the country are having the same experience. However, there are a few dedicated volunteers who still heed the call.

The LVFC is honored to have one of its founding volunteer members, Jimmy Goss, remaining as an active supporter of the LVFC. Other long-time volunteer members include Jimmy Hobbie and Mike Donatelli.

The Fire Company has been involved in other civic activities throughout the years such as providing rides for families on the mighty fire truck at the Lucketts Fair. They have also ferried Santa Claus throughout the Lucketts community to the delight of girls and boys.

Lucketts Bluegrass Turns 37

In the early 1970s, about the only place for a band to perform during the winter months was in bars and taverns. Mr. E.J. Spence and his family's band sought a more wholesome place where they could express their talent. In late 1973, a "chance" meeting on a Leesburg street between Mr. Spence and an official of the Lucketts Civic Association (LCA) changed all of that. The LCA official agreed to allow the family band to perform at the under-used old Lucketts School. Hence, the genesis of Lucketts Bluegrass!

On January 12, 1974, the weekly bluegrass concert series was launched and 37 years later, the program is still in full swing. It is said to be the longest, continual, scheduled bluegrass concert series in the world. Run entirely by volunteers who appreciate the importance of this historical art form, the series has hosted hundreds of performances by local, regional, and national bands from Ralph Stanley and Doyle Lawson to the Seldom Scene, The Country Gentlemen, and Nothin' Fancy. It has been referred to as "the Ryman of bluegrass"; the reference is to Nashville's Ryman auditorium, the long-time home of the Grand Ole Opry!

For many years, the "bluegrass volunteers" were the folks who executed the concerts on each Saturday night from October through April, excluding major holiday weekends. Sponsorship, promotion and administration were provided by the Lucketts Community Center Advisory Board and the community center staff. However, by

2005, the bluegrass program had grown to the point where a new non-profit entity, The Lucketts Bluegrass Foundation, was formed to administer the complete bluegrass program in partnership with the community center. Today, the individuals who volunteer to make the concerts possible include both those with the management and administrative skills to operate

The Freedom Center Needs Volunteers

“The Freedom Center” on Taylorstown Road is a non-profit educational, retreat and camping facility with a varied past. Originally built in the 1950’s as an alternative high school, the Glaydin School and Camp, it housed students and a few teachers. Following several decades of decline and neglect, the current owners purchased it in 2004. And thanks to scores of volunteers, the organization is slowly bringing this rural setting back to life.

The Freedom Center hosts retreats, summer camps, corporate meetings and classes in their chapel, lodges and education building. And their best feature is the nearly 100 acres of nature. Guests are awe-struck by the beauty of the natural foliage, the native species of trees and plants. Some have even commented that when walking the grounds, they felt the sense of being transformed into another world! Forestry and botany experts have toured the property and offered invaluable help and ideas on how to continue to preserve its natural beauty for the time to come.

Future plans include increasing their amenities and services with a dining hall, an archery range, a interpretive nature program, picnic pavilions, a low and high ropes course, and a fitness trail. They dream big because they believe in the importance of making this property the best it can be for the benefit of the people of our community. The Center is also the Loudoun site for the Phillips School, a high school program offering academics and vocational training for at-risk youths from Loudoun and Fairfax counties.

If you are looking for another avenue to give back to our Lucketts community and you have interest in nature trails or programs, landscaping, tutoring, plumbing or carpentry, the Freedom Center can use your help. This is your opportunity to work on a variety of projects and clock some community service hours.

All are welcome to come and walk through the property—sit by the lake, walk the trails, listen to the woodpeckers. But first, please contact the Freedom Center to let them know you are coming to visit. And remember to leash your pets and yield use of the picnic and sports areas to the retreat groups.
