


Lucketts Childcare Going to the Animals

Community Center Renovations

Loudoun County residents voted to invest \$13 million to restore, renovate and expand 5 community centers, including Lucketts. This funding is allocated for immediate upgrades focused on safety and bringing things up to code while also generating ideas of what the community desires for the longer term.

The Lucketts Community Center Advisory Board has been seeking input to help identify the community's priorities to pass along to the Architectural consultants hired by the County to develop immediate and longer term plans to renovate the community center. Based on the priorities established by Parks, Recreation, and Community Services, this process will generate architectural and engineering plans that would be used for the longer term when additional funding is obtained. These longer term plans could define larger facilities like a gymnasium, pool, or pre-school wing of 6-8 classrooms.

We have heard from some folks, but need to hear from more of you. Following is a summary of what we've heard thus far. We'd love to hear your reaction and additional thoughts. Big Picture

The community center is at the crossroad that defines Lucketts and thus folks view it as the physical "center" of our community. It is, however, only utilized by people involved in preschool, childcare, or specific programs and classes. Existing programming and hours of operation limit it from serving the broader community. This capital project is viewed as an opportunity to plan the transformation of the center into a place that truly is the center of the Lucketts community—a place where the community can come together.

- The community loves the building and wants to see it preserved and used as a community center. Any additions should be consistent with the current architecture and rural setting.
- People support specific upgrades to the building that will better serve the core "customers" added security, improved classrooms, improved bathrooms, etc. but would like to see

these upgrades better utilize the space so it is more accessible and available for programming for all ages.

 The community would not be served well if \$2.5 million were invested to simply renovate the building as it -- we need the facility to accommodate additional programming (including sports and recreational space) to serve the growing community.

Immediate Needs

Recreation room(s) for teens and adults, open for drop-in 7 days a week, including evenings.

- Free wi-fi internet access and community computer(s)
- Lounge area with informal library (take-one-share-one bookshelves, possible weekly visits from mobile library unit)
- Game room–pool table, Wii (virtual sports), cards, checkers, etc.
- Self-serve coffee, sodas, and snack vending

New space for growing afterschool program—there is a significant demand to separate the program into two age groups.

Increased access to the upstairs area that is currently underutilized.

Improved kitchen to accommodate catering, community group dinners, pancake breakfasts and cooking classes.

Better exterior signage and entrance area to make the center more welcoming to visitors and patrons. A layout that guides visitors where to go once inside.

Additional staff to develop and implement new programming—more for all ages.

- Cooking, art, writing classes, etc.—perhaps get local business people to teach classes (cooking, art, etc.)
- Game nights and "tournaments"—Wii tournaments are popular at a lot of senior centers and also with youth; could bridge generations
- Youth music, theater, dance classes with regular performance opportunities
- Regular community get-togethers with entertainment (e.g., family concerts, dinners, etc.)

Playground security—people would like to see a fully fenced playground. Safe passage from the playground to the basketball court and eating pavilion have been requested—prompting some to suggest moving the playground to behind the building—away from Route 15.

Upgrade outdoor basketball court to full-court size.

Create more soccer fields available for LYSA.

Short-term Ideas

Barn-style "shell" structure with multi-purpose potential

- Basketball, volley ball, gymnastics, indoor track, and other indoor sports
- Exercise Room–(with before and after-work access)
- Large event facility—for traditional "community hall" uses like large dinners, dances, bingos, receptions
- Ability to utilize this space for local business expos or "marketplace" and art shows
- Additional indoor exhibition space for the fair

Longer-term questions

Is a community pool ever a possibility? There is demand for a pool but there are over-riding questions about feasibility.

Could we look at creating an outdoor amphitheater—to build on the Lucketts tradition of live music? The space would accommodate music, outdoor plays, movies, puppet shows and could be utilized for the fair.

Would the county consider new land acquisition to accommodate growth?

Equine Obstacle Course Clinic

Seventy-six horses and their people visited Rosemary Lawler's Rock Hill Farm on Limestone School Road March 29th to tackle uniquely designed challenges during the Tri-State Riding Club's Confidence Building Obstacle Course Clinic. Rock Hill Farm was a new venue for the annual event, a fundraiser for the adult

riding education club, that has held the event in years past at the Loudoun County 4-H Fairgrounds in Leesburg.

There were numerous local participants and all the equines and their riders/handlers seemed to enjoy the over 25 colorful tests, including several bridges—one was a "teetertotter". Also there was a "bat cave" tunnel, the "picnic" area, and the Halloween obstacle, complete with a talking skeleton that popped up out of a coffin. There were many ways to move large and small balls and other items, whether it was by pushing with a broom, or stick, or even

by dragging in wagons. Flags, stuffed animals, water guns, and a "jousting station" were all part of the course, and each obstacle was optional.

Regardless of riding style or horse breed or discipline, Tri-State's obstacle clinic helps people acclimate their horses to unusual "things" so they can overcome spooky situations they may encounter on a trail ride, at a show, or even in the back yard. Tri-State also provided ample volunteers posted throughout the grounds to assist riders/handlers, so the experience was a confidence-building, positive one – and a lot of fun for all.

Feedback from the participants unanimously indicated that the riders loved the new venue because it was completely fenced and had plenty of room to accommodate all the horses in each timeslot. The extra space allowed the horses and riders to work

through obstacles at their own pace.

Patty Tracey, Tri-State's Training
Director and lead organizer of
the event said, "My goal is to
provide events and programs where
our members can increase their
knowledge of horsemanship, both
mounted and unmounted. This
event is a prime example of how
TSRC members help others to
improve their skills and, at the same
time, improve their relationship with
their own horse."

The Lucketts Community Center we know today was once a busy school serving the entire Lucketts community. As times changed and populations grew new schools were built including the present Lucketts Elementary School. The Old School was retired and slated for demolition. In 1972 with the help of Cindy Welch, an ad hoc group of Lucketts residents formed the Lucketts Citizens to Save the Old Lucketts School. The group consisted of Dick Snooks, Bob & Delores Staats, Alice Coughlin, Joyce Webb, Marshal Shry, Martha Hopler, Frosty & Betty Hutton, Sandy & Lou Difflipo, Ann Tedesco, Berkley & Helen Barnhouse with Alice Coughlin taking minutes. This group kept up the task of seeing that the building was preserved.

In an effort to raise funds for the restoration of the Old School the Citizens group started and ran the original Lucketts Fair. It was a wonderful glimpse into a rural community at its productive best. There were no climbing walls or baskets from Africa, but what was there were fine local crafts, produce, baked goods, butter churning, blacksmithing, real hay rides, farm animals, bingo and the ever famous blue grass music. It was a solid start to an annual Lucketts tradition.

In 1975, the Citizens group disbanded when Loudoun County Parks & Rec took over the building. With the guidance of Ellen



reserected as the Lucketts Community Center.

The Lucketts Fair was soon to become a more commercial affair with vendors invited to sell all manner of goods with a bend toward the traditional rural crafts and an infusion of some contemporary wares. Along with the increase in size came a gate charge for the day, with all proceeds to aid in the restoration of the Community Center.

The Lucketts Ruritan were one of the early food purveyors with their offering of soft drinks and the most delicious ribs. Today you will see slushees, slurpees, shish-ka-bobs and gyros but you can't beat the Ruritan ribs! The Ruritan continue to cook and with the help of Roy's Concessions have expanded their menu. In addition to being a main stay of the Lucketts Fair the Ruritan park cars for this and other local events, take trash and recycling on Saturdays, award scholarships to Lucketts graduates and other helpful civic services.

Thanks to all who worked hard to save our old school!

Help the Lucketts Elementary School PTA continue its long ice-cream-making history by participating in its annual Family Fun Day and Ice Cream Churning event August 9 at the school. Elementary school parents and the greater community are invited



to join the PTA to help hand churn the 300 gallons of home made ice cream that is sold at the Lucketts Fair. While the men folk typically turn the churns and the women folk assist with the locally grown fruits and mixes, the kids have their own fun things to do while Mom and Dad make ice cream. Plans for the children include supervised play -- a junior tractor pull, water games, arts and crafts in the gym, and other fun games and projects. Snacks and drinks will also be provided throughout the day to make it easy for every family to come and spend two hours helping out.

We need a total of 54 adult volunteers, each for only 2 hour shifts, to make the 300 gallons of ice cream we sell at the Fairall proceeds to benefit the school.

Every program the PTA runs, including American Citizen Club, after school clubs and the Potomac River Rangers, is funded by ice cream proceeds. Every field trip is paid for in part through ice cream sales. Every family event like Fall Festival, Breakfast with Santa, is paid for by ice cream sales. We need every family in our school to help with this great effort because every child in the school and every family benefits from it. And all the fair goers appreciate the delicious ice cream!

Mark you calendars now to join us August 9 for your two hour shift and be a part of what makes the Lucketts Fair so special. You need not have an elementary age child. You can also sign up to SCOOP and sell ice cream at the fair which will be August 23 and 24th this year.

Not too soon to plan for Lucketts Fair contests!

Now that summer is officially here, it is time to start getting ready for the 2008 Lucketts Fair fruit pie and largest vegetable and sunflower contests! Mark the date of Saturday, August 23rd for all you amateur cooks and gardeners to strut your stuff.

Why a fruit pie contest?

Pie baking will always be a special part of country cooking because pie baking and the community of Lucketts are inseparable!

Pie power should never be underestimated! Lucketts cooks make their homemade pies count for more than just good eating. Skill in baking marvelous pies lifts spirits, promotes contentment, and brightens rainy days. Even though the pie customs have changed along with the countryside, pie bakers in the Lucketts area still bake pies for their family, friends, and community and fire house suppers.

Those who lived in, and still live in, this rural community have been making pies "forever." Local farm women always included pies when the harvest crews went from farm to farm to thresh wheat, put up hay or to help butcher. These crews, comprised of neighboring farmers and their own hired help, are now part of our history.

The first Lucketts Fair fruit pie contest was held in the early 1980's. Contestants were a few local cooks who had access to fruits, berries, and cherries from their own orchards. As the years went by, ribbons and prizes were awarded, special judges

were invited, and the contest began to attract entries from all of Northern Virginia. The contest has become so popular that preregistration is now necessary and a limit set on the number of entries for both a senior and junior division!

The challenge is on for the Lucketts pie bakers to win the ribbons this year! It is not too late to get the pie pans and rolling pins out to start perfecting your fruit pie to enter the 2008 Lucketts Fair's annual contest.

Just remember that the pie must be made of fruit and that no cream or custard based pies or pies needing refrigeration will be accepted. The Cooperative Extension Service judging rules are used for scoring.

Largest Sunflowers, tomatoes and zucchini!

The Lucketts Fair's contests for the largest sunflowers,

tomatoes and zucchini are just a few years old but it is obvious that the gardeners of Lucketts are as tenacious as the pie bakers!

Growing vegetables for family use or for market has been part of life in Lucketts since the first farmers began to till the land. Saturday, August 23rd will be the day for this year's contest.

The Lucketts Volunteer Fire Company and the County of Loudoun Fire & Rescue have placed in service a new pumper, which is known as Engine 610. It replaced the old pumper, which Company #10 agreed to give to the County Fire & Rescue Training Center to be used for training.

The new pumper came completely equipped and includes a 50 gallon foam tank system. Foam is used on some fires, making it possible to use less water to extinguish flames and is used as a coating to protect nearby structures from burning.

The pumper has a 750 gallon water capacity and can pump up to 1500 gallons of water a minute. The engine has a tack force suspension, making it drive as easily as a passenger car.

At the station, the engine joins a rescue engine, 2 tankers (one is a reserve), a jeep and an old brush truck that will be replaced

any day, according to James Hobbie, President of Lucketts Volunteer Fire Company #10. More information will be available when it arrives.

The fire and rescue personnel at the station invite everyone to stop by and check out the new acquisition.

When I moved here in 2001, I knew the Lucketts area was beautiful, but I didn't realize how bountiful the natural world was here. I have a little over 5.5 acres on Lost Corner Road that has a stand of mature loblolly pine trees, a view of the Catoctin Mountains, and a wide open vista to watch the weather come and go, the sun and moon rise and set, and I can still see a pretty fair

This is great, but I am also thrilled with all the wildlife I get to see every day. When I lived in St. Paul, Minnesota, I had to travel 4-5 hours north to get to see the variety of birds, especially my favorite – the

number of stars at night.

Great Blue Heron, that I can just see from my deck or by going for a walk in my neighborhood or along the C&O Canal Path.

And this natural world is very close. I was astounded to look out my home office window recently to discover a bird's nest with three eggs in it in the butterfly bush literally right outside my window. When the bird came back to her nest, it was a Cardinal, and she is keeping an eye on me while I keep an eye on her. I can hardly wait for the eggs to hatch and watch the babies grow up.

In our pine trees, there is a family of Sharp-shinned Hawks that chatter about their hunting prowess and will perch on a branch at the edge of the pines while they have lunch of frog or small varmint. There are also Pileated Woodpeckers, Downy Woodpeckers, Flickers, Blue Jays, Wild Turkeys,

Green Herons, Snowy Egrets that regularly pay visits. I've also seen other critters as

well – lots of deer (oh dear, the deer are everywhere and eat almost everything), foxes, rabbits galore (to keep the dogs entertained), skunks (do not keep the dogs entertained), turtles, frogs that cause quite the ruckus in the spring with their "music," and snakes. Along the C&O, I regularly walk by a Bald

Eagle nest and see Wood Ducks, Cormorants,

Beavers, and more.

This is a beautiful and naturally rich area and I love being in the middle of it every day. It makes coming home from work a lot more fun and meaningful since I never know what I will see when I get there. But it is a natural reward I look forward to every day.

Editor's Note: Here is the update on the little Barred Rock hen who uses our house as her "birthing inn". Since the earlier batch of 4 chicks she has brought forth eleven more. They are safely near the house, (too near in some respects). The chicks come at a good time as we are down in the chicken count. Turns out we have had a fox in the barn yard who has found hot meals for

her kits this summer. We no longer can let the remaining 4 barn chickens run free.
