

Meet Linda Sher – Mobile Nurse Practitioner for Lucketts

One of the experiences of living in Lucketts, is the need to get in your car and drive to Leesburg, Lovettsville or even further to receive medical treatment. For many residents, this obstacle to service can mean going without care and treatment. Linda Sher, Family Nurse Practitioner with over 23 years of local nursing experience is taking her show on the road this month to serve our community. The "house call" is no longer on the "endangered species list" if you live in Lucketts. Making a connection with Linda Sher can give you the option of receiving the care you need in the convenience of your own home.

Linda has been a Lucketts resident since 2002 and worked at Leesburg Sterling Family Practice as well as INOVA Health System before establishing Sher Family Medicine. In April

2018, Governor Ralph Northam signed House Bill 793, which allows Virginia Nurse Practitioners (NPs) with the equivalent of five years of full-time practice with a collaborating physician to be certified to practice independently. Nurse Practitioners are also required to carry their own malpractice insurance. During her career within traditional physician practices, she would sometime make "house calls" but these events were always the exception – not the rule. Linda began taking care of her own parents several years ago and saw that there was an on-going need to serve house-bound seniors through mobile nurse practitioner services.

Nurse Practitioners are helping to reduce the cost of traditional healthcare and already work within most family medicine physician practices.

They screen and treat patients with many routine medical needs and are trained to recognize conditions that warrant attention by a doctor or specialist. The physician practice takes responsibility for filing insurance claims for the patients who are treated by these Nurse Practitioners. Linda does not accept payment directly from health insurance companies, but instead provides her patients with pre-coded invoices for services, which the patient can then file with their insurance company. This is the way she can deliver services in the home at a reasonable cost.

If you have never filed a claim with your insurance carrier before, you can go on the provider's website to learn how to file a claim. Linda's invoice for services will contain

all of the codes and information you will need to file your claim. You pay Linda and then seek reimbursement from your insurance company. After your claim is reviewed, you will receive an Explanation of Benefits from your provider and any reimbursement allowed by your policy.

When your children went back to school this year, or when they attended camp last summer, did you need to schedule a routine physical for them with your pediatrician? Next year one of your options would be to call Linda and schedule an appointment for her to come to your home for this service. Did you stay home from work last winter suspecting you had strep throat but were too sick to go into town to get a strep test

at the closest Urgent Care? This winter you could stay home and call Linda. Do you have an older family member living with you who will be hospitalized for a medical or surgical procedure this year? Worried about their care when they come home and you have to go back to work? Talk to the doctor in advance about using Linda's services for discharge planning and support during those first few days a family member is home after a hospitalization.

Linda is providing service 7 days a week and is doing both early morning and evening appointments to support busy working families. She is here to make life easier for everyone who lives in Lucketts by providing her in-home services to our community. You can reach Linda by phone at 571-439-1209. Ruritans Explore New Grant Process for 2019

Every year the Lucketts Ruritan Club takes monies raised through member activities and distributes them through donations and scholarships that benefit the Lucketts community. Donations and Scholarships have been the primary way that the Ruritan Club invests in the community. In planning for 2019, the Club, under the direction of the Scholarship Committee, is looking to implement a grant process that will fund proposals received from Lucketts area organizations or individuals that are focused on youth development and education. Since 2016 the Ruritan Club has been working to increase its focus on these two areas.

The club will be soliciting applications and reaching out to community organizations. Hopefully, this funding opportunity will generate new ideas from the Lucketts community that the club can support in addition to the current donations and scholarships programs.

The key difference between a donation and a grant is the level of control the donor exerts over how funds given are used by those who receive them. When the Ruritan Club makes a donation to an organization, the organization is able to use the money as they see fit without restrictions on use from the Club. For a grant, the organization in question would present an application or proposal to the Ruritan Club describing a future program or activity to support youth in our community. The application explains why the program or activity is important, what funding is required to support it, and how it will be implemented. The Club will then evaluate the application and decide whether to fund it. Grants provide an opportunity for an organization to gain funding in addition to any donations they may already receive. The Club is considering this approach for next year in order to better serve emerging needs of children who live in Lucketts.

Because this will be something new for the Club, anyone with expertise in establishing community-based grant programs is welcome to offer suggestions and assistance to the Ruritan Club. The goal is to make the process simple but accountable and to design criteria that are clear and focused. For more information please contact the club by email at luckettsruritan@gmail.com

Eagletree Farm

Jeff Judge of Eagletree Farm Vineyards on Harrison Hill Lane in Lucketts speaks with a mix of quiet conviction and energy that says they're about to do something big.

You may know Jeff and his wife Lori McKeever as the owners of the pick-your-own blueberries farm by White's Ford Regional Park, but there's a change coming soon. Eagletree Farm Vineyards has been selling grapes to Loudoun winemakers for a number of years, but by the new year, they'll be opening to the public for wine tasting. Additionally, a 40-person, farm-to-table restaurant featuring high-quality, locally-inspired dishes will open, complementing the winery and adding to the economic fabric of the area.

None of this happened overnight. "About 25 years!" says Jeff with a laugh, when he reflects on how long this moment has been in the making. While they've been actively building the winery—the physical structure—for over five years, they planted grapes almost 20 years ago. Since then, they've been selling grapes to other vineyards in Loudoun for winemaking. Three years ago they stopped selling their grapes and began bottling their own wines, building their supply in preparation for opening to the public.

Jeff got his first experiences in kitchens back in high school, first as a dishwasher at a hospital in Georgetown, then as a night cook at the Hecht company in Tyson's Corner. College was followed by 15 years in the communications industry. "It was less than fulfilling for me" he says. Things changed when he met his wife Lori McKeever.

When they got married, Lori was running McKeever's Pub in McLean, which was a local favorite for decades—patrons considered it their own version of the Cheers pub in Boston's Beacon Hill, popularized by the television show of the same name. Lori bought the establishment from the original owner in 1984. Jeff, while still holding his job in communications, occasionally helped out in the kitchen at McKeever's, and in the process, rediscovered his passion for working in the kitchen. He left his corporate job and started working full time at the pub. He was hooked.

While Jeff had a natural aptitude and enthusiasm for cooking, to formalize his training he enrolled at the elite French culinary school, L'Academie de Cuisine, in Gaithersburg MD, founded by the award-winning chef Francois Dionot. "It was the greatest experience of my life" says Judge, training under some top chefs including Patrice Olivon, who worked in the White House kitchen and defeated chef Cat Cora on the Food Network's Iron Chef show. During its 40-year run, L'Academie de Cuisine was home to the USA World Pastry Cup Team, and received international recognition for the quality of its program.



As with opening any business, there have been obstacles along the way; working with the county to obtain the necessary approvals, sorting through legal issues, and planning has taken time. Support has been strong however. At a 2017 public hearing, Rural Economic Development Council members noted the contributions of Judge and McKeever to Loudoun County's rural economy and the winegrowers association. County supervisors agreed, approving measures to clear the way for Eagletree Farm and Vineyards to expand their operations. "It was all very extensive and laborintensive, but we're now fully approved" says Judge.

While Judge will utilize his French cooking techniques, the menu itself is still in development. What's not in question though, is the high quality he will deliver by using locally-sourced ingredients. "Everybody likes good food. Products produced in a rural area need a market, and the closer the market is—where it's consumed—to where its grown means greater quality. When a buyer calls a distributor, they deliver a truck full of ingredients from who knows where. You don't know where it came from, and what they did to preserve the ingredients during shipping. Our menu will have locally sourced ingredients. The closer the better. This motivates us to provide a quality, wholesome product." As a local business owner, Judge says he wants to understand what traditions and preferences drive people's decisions when it comes to the food they eat. You have to talk to people, listen, and be flexible in what you offer. He believes using local ingredients, prepared according to his rigorous training, is the recipe for success.

Jeff looks forward to opening the new facility to the public in the next few months, and expects the winery to be open Friday through Sunday, from noon until about 6pm. To start, the restaurant will provide food service for the winery during the day, and probably reservations-only dining on the weekends, while they iron out their menu and hours. As a 25-year resident of Lucketts, Judge welcomes the community to come and experience the new Eagetree Farm Vineyard. You might even notice the well-worn, charismatic bar top from McKeever's Pub, which Jeff and Lori kept when they sold the business in 2015. Who knows—someday Eagletree Farm Vineyard may be the place "where everybody knows your name..."



Milestones Met as BSA Troop 1910 Celebrates 20 Years





June of 1998, the National Capitol Area Region of the Boy Scouts of America, issued a Charter for Boy Scout Troop #1910 in Lucketts, Virginia. The Troop chose this number designation as it represents the founding year for Boy Scouts of America. The Lucketts Ruritan Club is the sponsoring organization and Ruritan Tom Howder served as the Club's founding representative with the Troop leadership committee. Mr. Howder was an Administrative Law Judge (Retired) with the Federal Trade Commission, an active participant with the Ruritans and visibly involved with his community. Past Ruritan member Lee Herlocker was the 1st Scoutmaster bringing many years of experience to the Troop; not only from participating as a youth, but being active for many years as an adult leader. Ruritan member Matt Quitter is the Committee Chairman bringing the same leadership qualities as Mr. Herlocker.



Troop 1910 was founded with five Scouts and five adventurous Adults. The Troop has grown steadily, averaging 40 Scouts in the Troop. Through the years, there have been 6 Scoutmasters: Lee Herlocker, Sandy Collins, Steve Peters, Mike Harbert, Hal Raffensperger and current Scoutmaster Joe Elarde have guided this boy-led troop to many successes. We are forever in their debt.

The Troop is an active "boy-led" troop with back-to-the-basics concept of Scouting in mind. This emphasizes backpacking, hiking and camping with the Troop going on a monthly outing year round. Additionally, the Troop focus' on the skills necessary to achieve Rank advancements and earn Merit Badges and community service. To date, 56 Scouts have earned the Rank of Eagle, with several working on Eagle projects.

A Scout is Trustworthy, Loyal, Helpful, Friendly, Courteous, Kind, Obedient, Cheerful, Thrifty, Brave, Clean and Reverent.

Two of the five founding adults are still actively involved today with the Troop. Matt & Kay Quitter have given many hours to keeping the principles and basic foundation solid. They were presented the Founder's Bar to wear on their uniforms. This recognition is intended to emphasize the importance and pride of forming and nurturing a new Scouting unit. The Founder's Bar is worn by adults and youth whose names are on a new-unit charter and have remained with the Troop for 20 years.

You might wonder, where are these Scouts today? Of the 56 Eagles, over 70% have college or technical higher education. Some have or are serving in the Military, seeing combat. Some are in government service, law enforcement, public service or have started their own business. A few are living and working overseas. Fifteen percent are married, and two are known to have become fathers.

"When I heard about the 20th anniversary of the Troop, I thought it must be a mistake.

Then I realized I'm 31 – YEESH"

"My current career in government service has been greatly influenced by my time as a Scout. My Eagle Scout Certificate of Recognition hangs proudly in my work area and is a constant source of conversation. Scouts make great civil servants. As Scouts we learn the importance of teamwork, we learn skills that make us well-rounded. I think often about the oath I took when I took my job, but I never forget the first such oath I took – The Scout Oath. Although the language is different, the promise to do my best for my country is the same. I consider it a privilege to work for something bigger than myself. It was a privilege I didn't fully understand as a kid—or honestly even when I earned my Eagle Scout—but I'm grateful that I got my first taste for service at such a young age. It set me on this path. So, thank you and everyone in Troop 1910 for your part in giving me that experience."
