Talkin' Trash

Almost everyone in and around Lucketts is familiar with the Ruritan Club's Saturday morning "Trash" program at the Elementary School. Officially known as the Club's "Compactor and Recycling Service," this program is the Club's longest running and most significant source of funding. Patron donations help to provide for scholarships, grants, and support for Lucketts area students, schools, and non-profits.

The two-part service consists of a compactor truck for trash and two "roll-off" bins for recycling. Compactor service began 40 years ago in response to one of the community's most glaring problems at the time: dumping along our roadsides. In 1980, a charter member of the new Ruritan Club, Chet Martin, explored options to solve the dumping problem. A pilot program followed and a permanent service was soon up and running with the approval of the Club, Lucketts Elementary staff, the School Board, and County Supervisors.

In 1989, the Club added a recycling component, which required accepted items to be pre-sorted: aluminum cans; steel cans; bundled newspaper; and glass by color—clear, green, and brown. Over time, automation followed as off-site sorting facilities came online. The co-mingled recycling we know today is much faster and easier, but some simple rules still apply. The Recycling Guidelines below will help you to make your recycling efforts more efficient and cost effective.

Ruritan "Trash" was once 'the only game in town.' Other options were costly private rural collection or a 30-mile round trip to the landfill. The Club's new program proved to be cheap, convenient, and efficient, while also providing an opportunity to socialize with neighbors! Although today's Saturday morning Compactor and Recycling Service has competition from the curb-side pickup found in new subdivisions, our "Trash" service still maintains an advantage for the community—giving back.
